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Reflect and Discuss

We all know there is power in words. The words of friends, family, and even strangers can change our lives. This includes power quotes that we find. These quotes can come from people alive or dead. But they can provide powerful insights in compact containers. Share some of your favorite quotes that have made a difference in your life.

The First Quote

The best revenge is to be unlike
him who performed the injury.

Marcus Aurelius

This quote is simple in form but quite deep in its insight. The discussion between Jean, Jason, and John, quickly revealed that being unlike the offender is far more than simply avoiding the behavior he or she performed. To be unlike the offender is to offer them something qualitatively different than what he or she offered you or me. This means that the best revenge is to offer the offender something virtuous even when we feel emboldened to hold onto the injury (think about Jean's example).

Reflect and Discuss

Do you agree with the statement above? What makes it hard to offer virtue to the offender? What enables you to offer virtue to the offender?

Consider someone who has offended you and how you could offer them something different than what they offered you.

The Second Quote



Life is unfair. That is a fact. If life were fair, no child would ever die. If life were fair, everyone would look the same. If life were fair, cupcakes and potato chips would be good for you. Accepting that life is not fair is liberating. It reminds you that there are some things with which you have to deal and accept.


The second quote focuses on a difficult but important concept. Life is unfair. It just is. There are no guarantees or promises. Things happen to us, some of our own doing, and some because of the actions of others. But in either case, we can feel the sting of unfairness. Tafoya's quote reminds us that if we focus on what we can't control, and ride the horse of unfairness, it will lead us down a path of bitterness or worse.

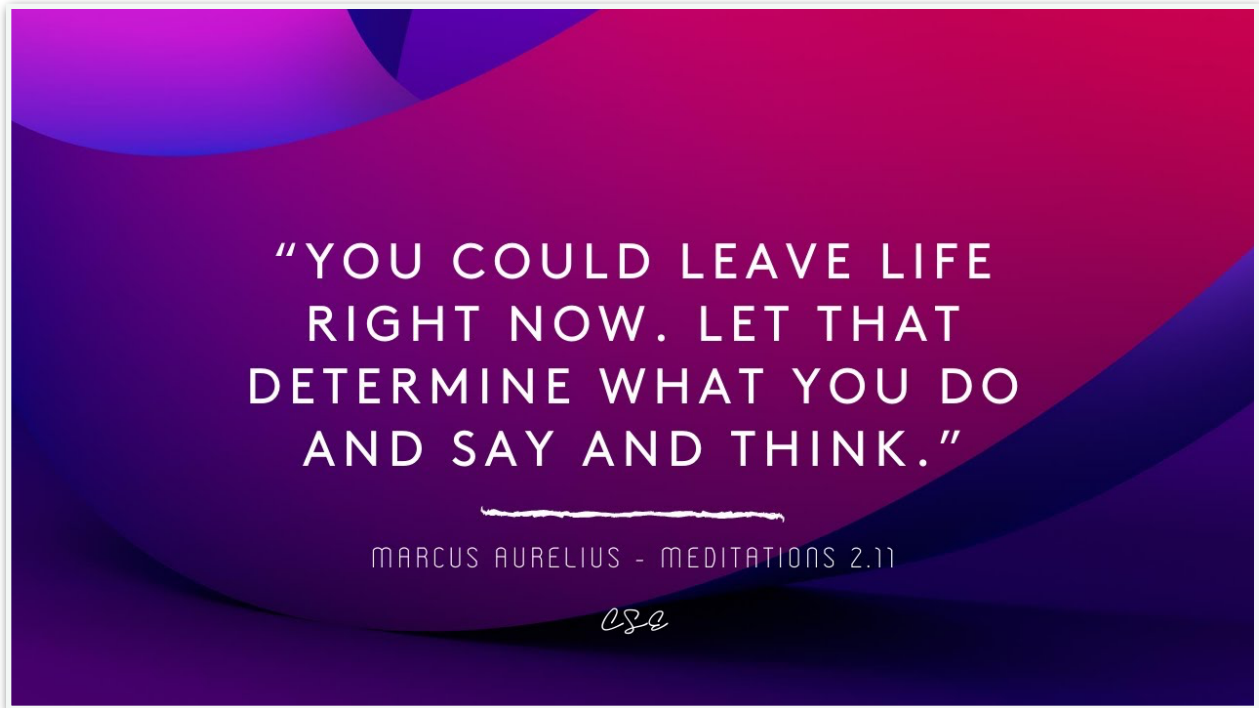

After Cast - The Fourth Quote

Try this: This week, before you enter a meeting or a conversation, remember Marucs' quote (above). Then begin your conversation or meeting and see how it changes it.
